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Introduction

The West End Residents' Association (WERA) was formed in 1999 after residents became concerned that the balance of the community was being changed by developers turning too many properties into houses of multiple occupation (HMO's) and the impact of the increase in student numbers.

Since its formation, a great deal of work has been done by the association not only for its longer-term residents but also for those who come to live in the West End for a short time. As an association we work with all people and organisations who can help us keep the West End as a balanced community and a place where everyone are proud to live in, respect and look after each other.

This booklet will give you an idea of some of the issues that we get involved in, from the formal issues of planning; noise; waste; parking permit scheme; derelict buildings; traffic as well as the more enjoyable projects, such as the Big Lunch and the Carholme Gala.

Our Beautiful West Common

From wide open spaces to free to use sports facilities, the West Common has been a place for the whole community to enjoy for hundreds of years. Have a read and discover its history and how we can work together to preserve its future.

The West Common is protected by the 'Commons Act 2006' which is a nationwide act protecting all common land in England and Wales. The commons are a designated 'Critical Natural Asset', which protects the flora and fauna that inhabit the area. This means a 'look but don't remove' policy which protects this ancient land and ensures that it remains for future residents to enjoy.

The West Common extends to both sides of Saxilby Road. The south side is mainly leased to

Carholme Golf Club. This is a private club but anyone can enjoy a round of golf for a fee payable at the clubhouse. On the north side we have all weather and grass tennis courts and these are free for anyone to use. Bowls is also available with the green maintained by Carholme Bowls club and if you wish to play you can join the club. We also have a cricket ground complete with pavilion – Carholme Cricket Club play here and always welcome new members and spectators.

The remainder of the Common is open space plus a large maintained area with two football goals, and there are a number of large information boards that provide all the information you need to explore this jewel of the West End in a safe and responsible way. **Enjoy!**





West End Lights shine again!

Friday 6th December 2019

It's Lincoln's annual home grown pop-up festival of light that not only takes to the streets but it lights them up too!

It started in 2010 when a few houses shone out across the icy snow that held the city in its wintry grip. Since then it has grown and in 2018 over 60 houses, schools and the church were involved. It's sparked similar festivals in Tunbridge Wells, London and Toronto.

Front windows become cinema screens, shadow puppets step out of the darkness and light sculptures grow in West End gardens. It's created entirely by volunteers, local residents both old and new and shines for one night only each year.

At its heart though is our West End where each year images flicker from houses, projections

creep up walls and lights bloom in roadside trees. It's become a unique local tradition when residents wrap up warm to gather on street corners to marvel at their neighbours' creations and surprised passersby stop to look again at the trickery of light that has magically appeared in front of them.

Professor Mary Stuart, Vice Chancellor of The University of Lincoln

Over 200 people visited the event over the two days to share memories of the West End. The display included over 150 old photographs of the West End as well as maps and other memorabilia, and on the Saturday we were treated to a very interesting and informative talk on the history of the area by Dr Andrew Walker.

Dr Walker was involved in the production of the history booklet about the West End which was produced by the Survey of Lincoln, which is currently out of print. Friends of West End Play Spaces

The 'Friends of West End Play Spaces' are a group residents who have come together to redevelop the play park outside Carholme Children's Centre on Blenheim Road.

They have successfully made repairs to the equipment and transformed the space into a usable area for the local community. This has been achieved with the help of volunteers, funds raised by Councillor Robert Parker, and contributions from the County Council. However, the redevelopment would not have been possible without the free labour and materials provided by local tradesmen Richard Betts and Simon Davis.

They have now received pledges of ongoing

sponsorship from a number of local businesses and the funds from their sponsorship will be used to pay for ongoing maintenance costs and ensure the

space doesn't once again fall into disrepair.

Small steps... become a Street Warden

The WERA Street Warden Scheme has been operating for some time now and has had a great deal of success in keeping our streets tidy with the assistance of Lincoln City Council.

There are still areas which are not covered by the scheme and more volunteer wardens would be great. The main aim of the scheme is to ensure that refuse and recycling bins are taken back off the footpaths as quickly as possible after emptying.

The role of the warden is to monitor a specific street/streets on the Monday following Friday's bin collection, and where bins are still

left out a reminder card is delivered to the property. If the bin is still out on the Wednesday following the Warden reports this to WERA and the information is then forwarded to the council for action – usually a visit to the property in the first instance.


Other things that the wardens can report to WERA include bags of rubbish left on footpaths or accumulating in front gardens, street lights not working, drains blocked etc.

'To Let' Boards

In January 2019, the government informed the City of Lincoln council that its proposal to ban the display of 'To Let' boards in the West End had been successful.

The ban came after the council considered the results of several consultations with the public in problem areas, and complaints from residents and the Students Union who were concerned that they were creating an unnecessary eyesore. A total of 134 consultation responses were received by the council, with 85 of those responses calling for a total ban on the boards. The area where the ban is in force in the West End is shown here.

Resident's Parking Permit Consultation

Following concerns raised by residents, a working group made up of WERA, City of Lincoln Council and local councillors organised a resident's consultation in late early 2019.

The questions were agreed by the group and based upon issues raised by residents through discussions with WERA and local councillors and at a number of local meetings. The consultation was distributed to over 2000 properties in the West End (including properties that fell outside the West End but were included in specific zones). The consultation was available to complete either in hard copy form or online.

Data obtained leading up to the consultation identified that there is roughly one parking space available for every two permits issued. Figures for the number of spaces available is not completely accurate as the number of spaces is estimated based on length of available kerb, but is felt to be a reasonable guide.

There were 266 responses to the survey (around 12%), across 5 zones. The survey asked 11 specific questions, and the responses were as follows:

- 1. Enforcement Times 52% voted for no change to the enforcement times
- 2. Zones 72% voted against merging one or more zones together
- 3. Zones 82% voted against merging all zones together
- 4. Zones 74% voted to leave the zones as they
- 5. Visitor Bays 81% voted against removing visitor bays
- 6. Visitor Bays 68% voted against reducing the number of visitor bays
- 7. Visitor Bays 72% voted to leave visitor bays as
- 8. Flats 77% voted for flats to be allowed a maximum
- 9. Businesses 51% voted for businesses to apply for extra permits with the decision to grant being at the discretion of the councillor responsible

There were a number of suggestions to the question about how the current space in the West End might be utilised better for parking and comments made on each section above, and the group will meet to discuss the merits of these suggestions, but basically the feedback from those residents who completed the survey is to leave the main parts of the scheme as they are.

Slow It Down (SID)

With the kind help and support of the Long Leys Residents' Association (LLRA) and Lincolnshire Safer Roads Partnership, we have been able to gain access to SID (Speed Indicator Device).

We have already deployed SID opposite St. Faith's School and will be exploring further locations throughout the West End. The idea behind SID is to reduce the speed that people drive, as a good proportion of the area has speed limits of 20mph.

For the first week or so in any location, you won't see SID light up. This is because it has two display modes, standard display mode and spy mode. Spy mode collects the number of cars that drive past it, and the speed at which they drive. It does not collect number plate data, as it is intended to be a deterrent. When standard display mode is turned on it also collects the above data, but it will also display the speed it is being driven past at, with

a slow down/thank you message. We have five potential locations to put the sign: two on West Parade, two on Hewson Road and one at the junction of West Parade and Moor Street. The reason for so

current location and two on Hewson Road, but

The sign will be moved every six weeks, and will be deployed over the other side of the Common for the most part. We will likely have it around peak school times (start of term etc.) to try to influence the speed people drive. Noisy Neighbours?

Advice from the City of Lincoln Council

If your neighbours are often noisy and disturb the enjoyment of your home, the City of Lincoln Council Public Protection & Anti-Social behaviour Team (PPASB) can help. This page tells you who to contact if you have a noise complaint, and how it will be dealt with.

A few things to remember:

- You should get to know your neighbours to build a positive and respectful relationship
- In the first instance, you should try to resolve the problem with your neighbour
- Property related noise complaints are dealt with by City of Lincoln Council's PPASB Team, not the Police
- The PPASB Team is unable to accept anonymous complaints
- The PPASB Team does not operate a 24 hour service
- Neither the Police or City of Lincoln Council have any powers in respect of transient noise (i.e. noise from passers-by), although incidents reported to the PPASB Team will be logged.

How to make a noise complaint:

- 1. To contact the PPASB Team call 01522 873378 or email ppasb@lincoln.gov.uk.
- 2. You will need to provide your own details along with the address of where the noise comes from.
- 3. A letter will then be sent to the noisemaker advising them to take steps to reduce the noise. A letter will also be sent to you (the complainant) enclosing a diary sheet which should be completed and returned to the PPASB Team if the noise is not reduced satisfactorily. In some circumstances a PCSO will visit the premises following a complaint.
- 4. On receipt of the completed diary sheet, the PPASB Team will contact you to discuss the next steps. This may involve having noise monitoring equipment fitted in your home to monitor the noise levels. If the council finds a statutory noise nuisance then it will take appropriate action.

The PPASB Team works closely with partner agencies such as Police, University of Lincoln and The Students Union to ensure that a robust approach is taken to resolving noise complaints.
















A Safe Community

Working to reduce anti-social behaviour

We're pleased to say we had a relatively calm freshers fortnight in 2018. A strong Police, Council and University presence is key during this time and we shall see the same again this year.

On behalf of the whole community we have been working closely with the University to address issues of noise and anti-social behaviour from a very small minority of our students, who choose to not respect the local community.

As well as noise issues we've been addressing the speeding and traffic calming issues on Hewson Road and West Parade. We're pleased to say we're working with Long Leys Road Association to share the use of Lincolnshire Safer Roads Partnership Speed Camera to remind drivers of the speed restrictions in the area.
